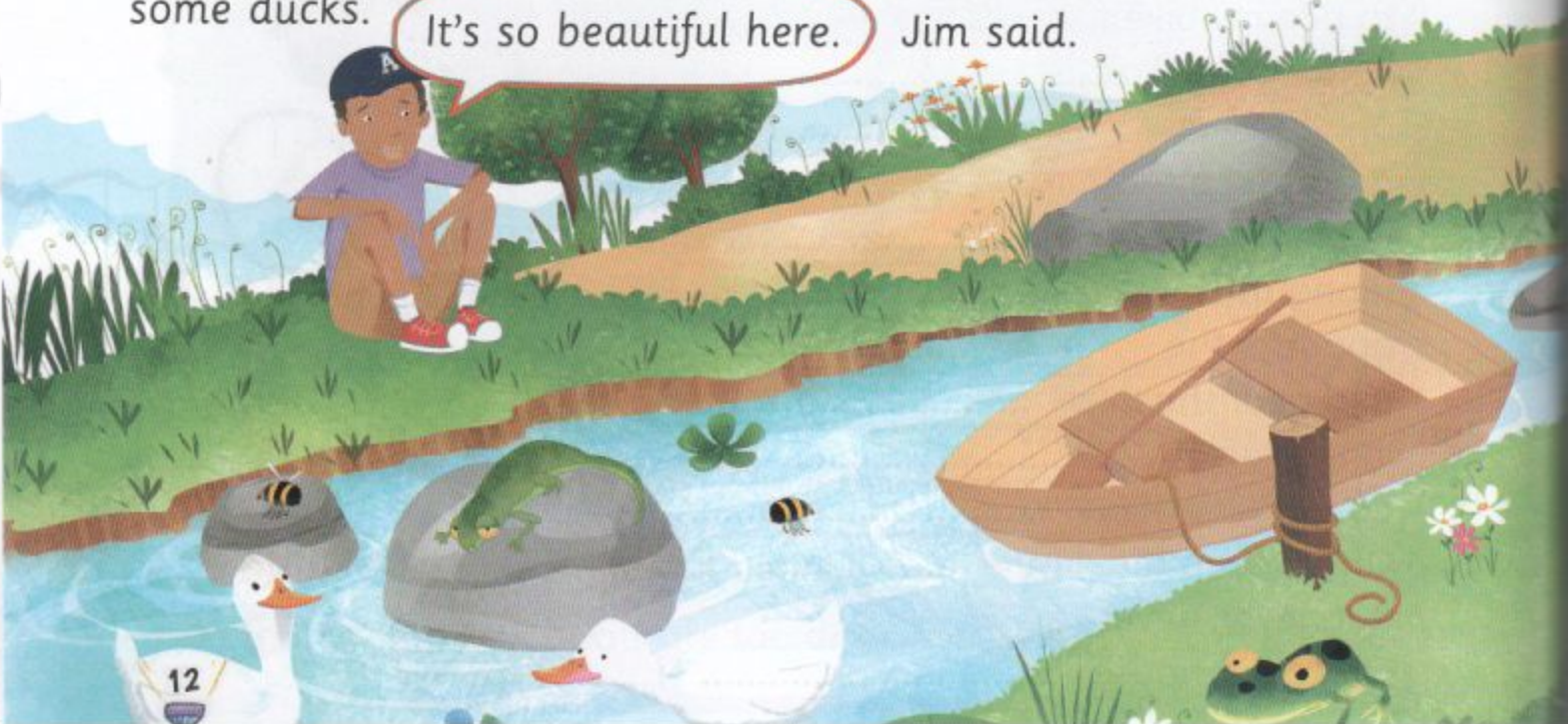
# The perfect present

'How about a lime or some peas or beans?' asked Mrs Star.

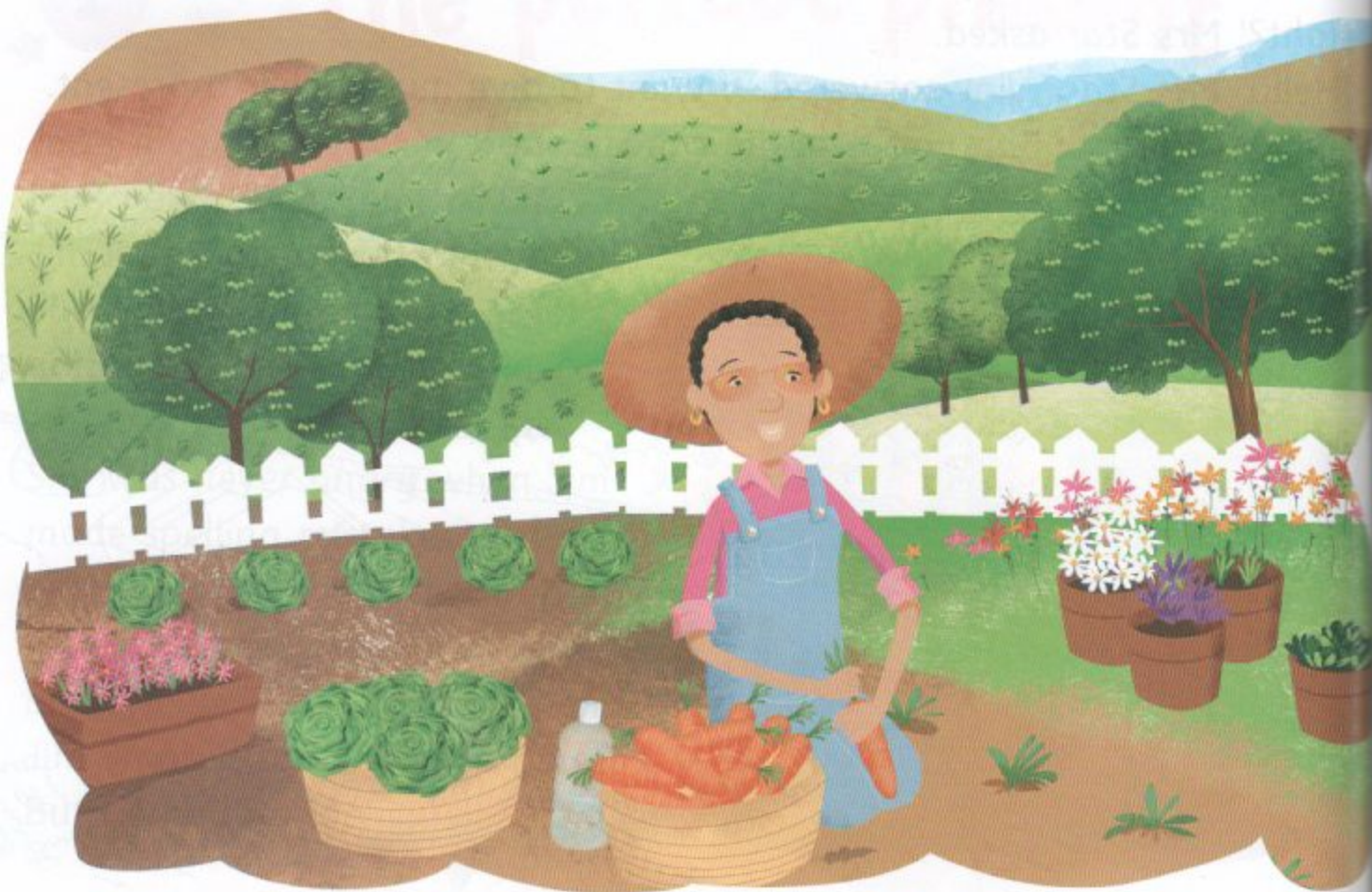
'They're green.'

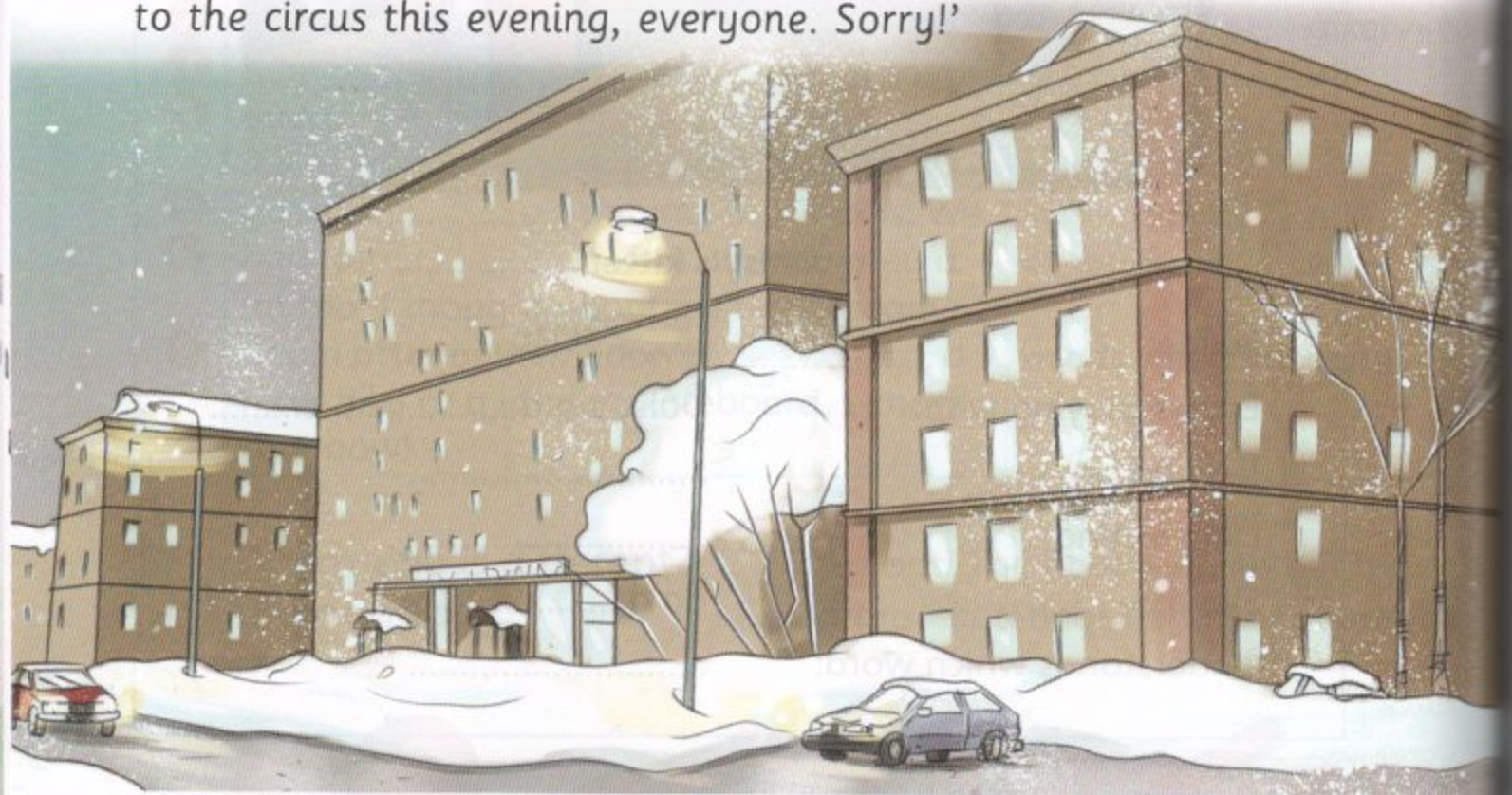




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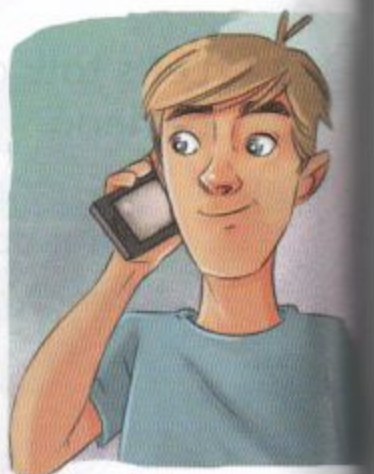
# A busy Monday

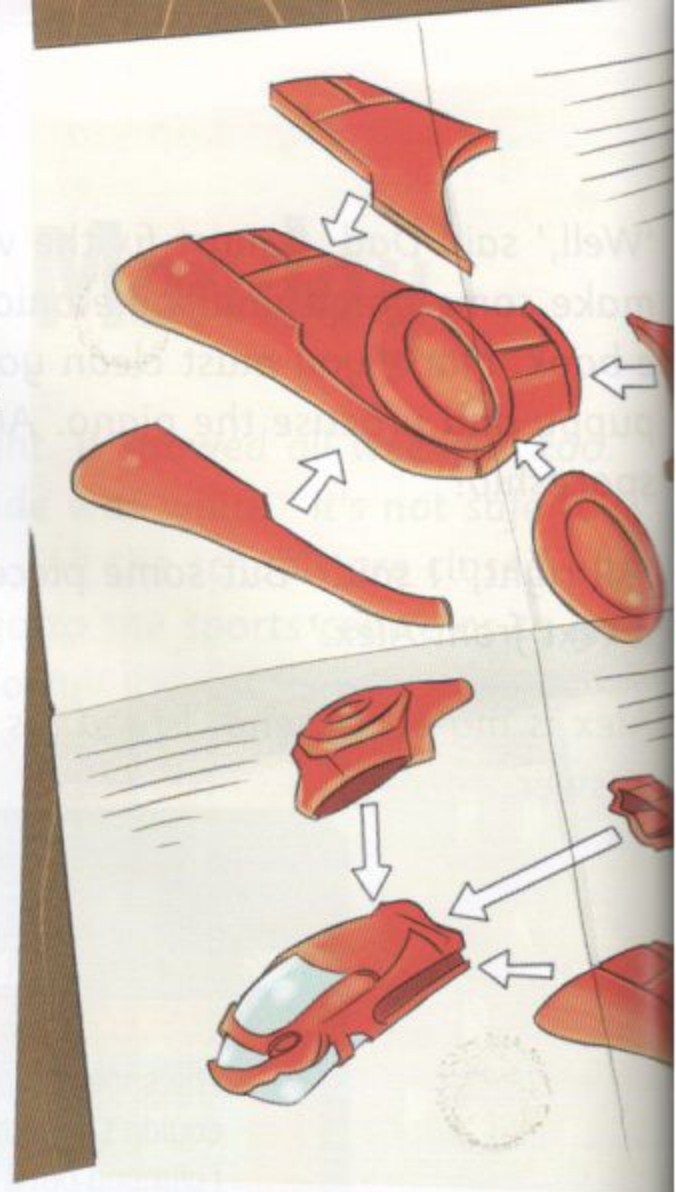

'We haven't got all the pieces for the spaceship!' I called to my parents. 'Well, help me paint this hall!' Mum said.

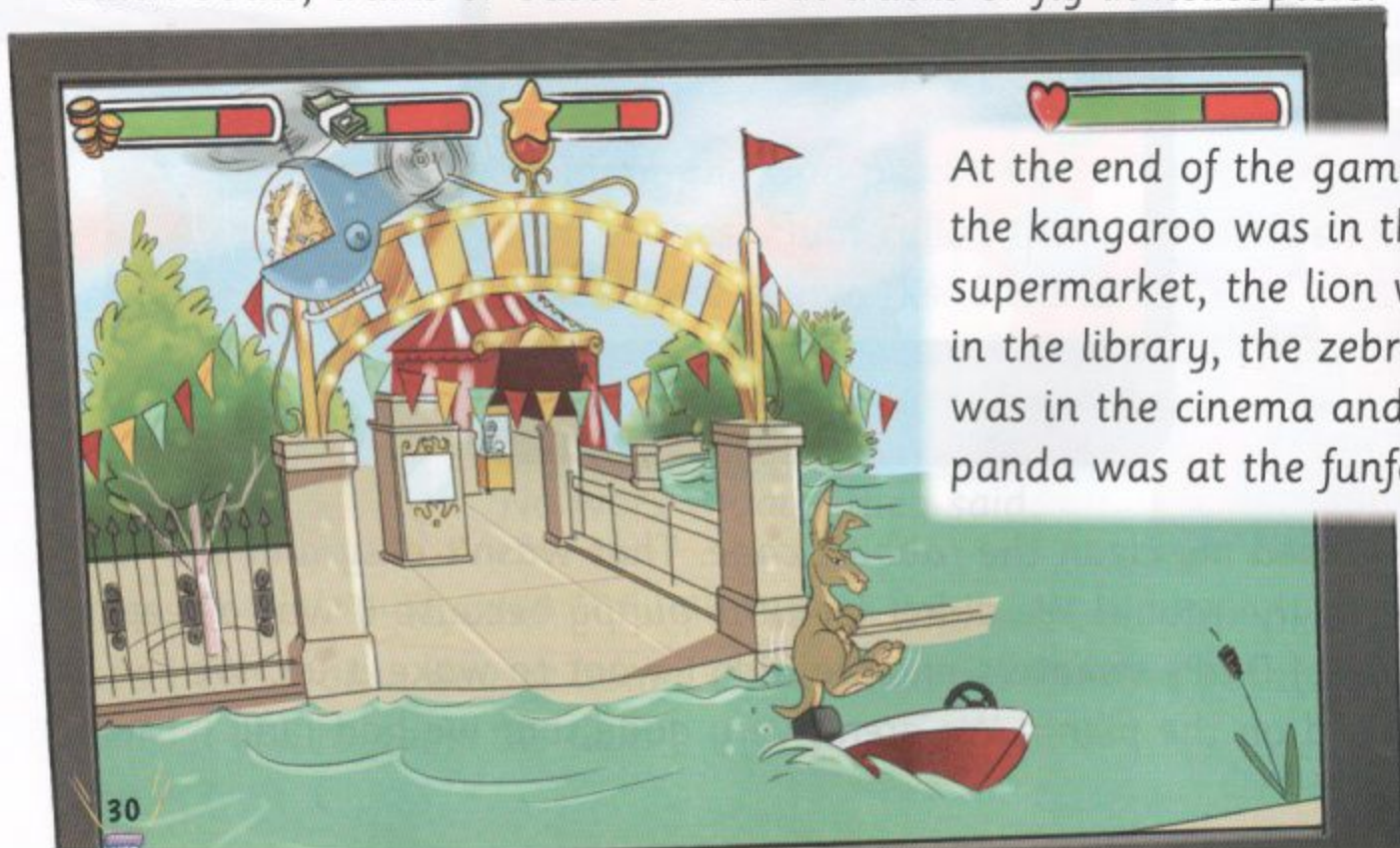
'Or help me fix this washing machine!' Dad said.

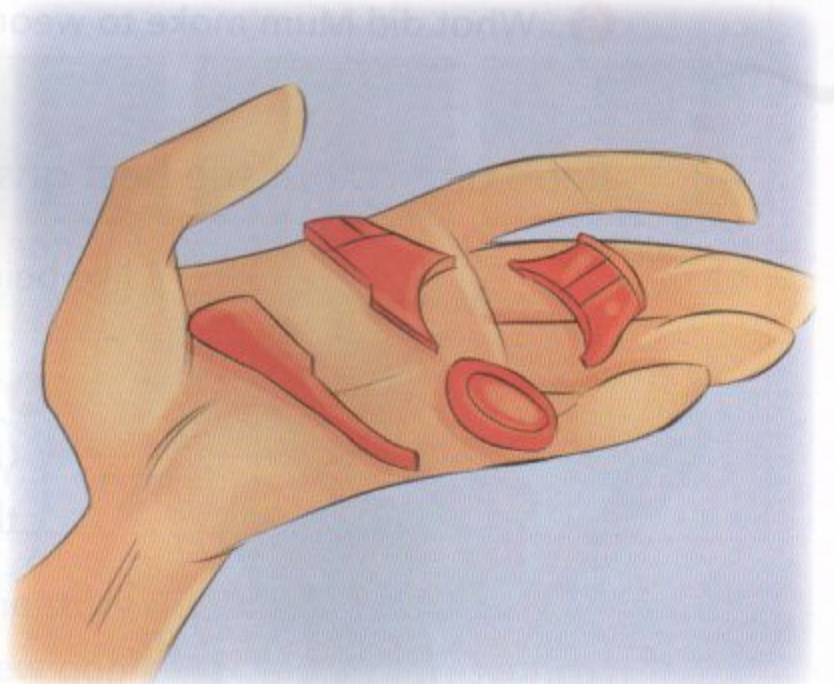
'That's right, but what about making that model spaceship?' Dad asked.

One morning, Tom woke up and walked to his window. The river looked like a mirror in the sun and the trees danced in the wind.

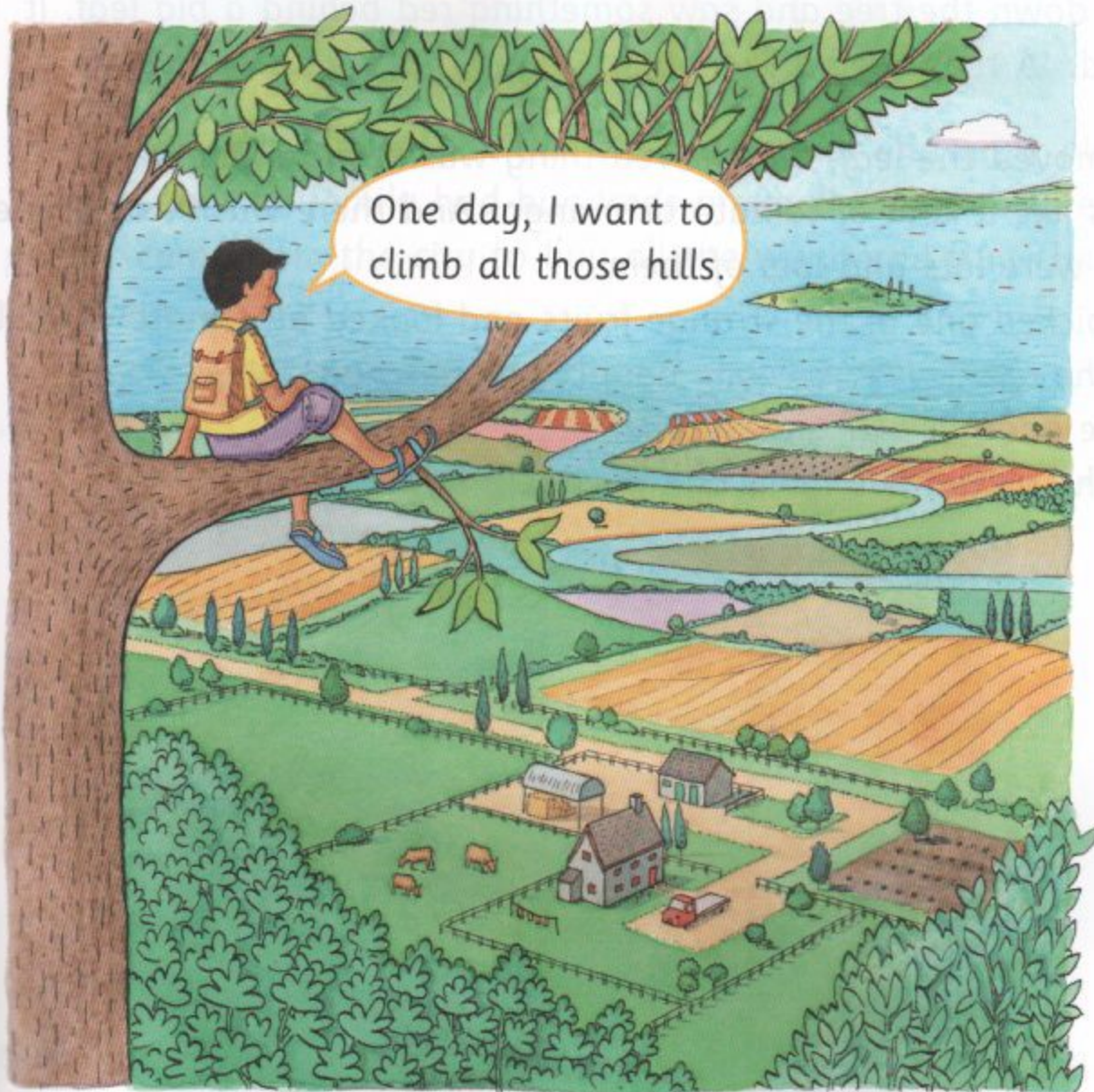
'Hmm,' Tom thought. 'Today is a good day to be in the forest.'

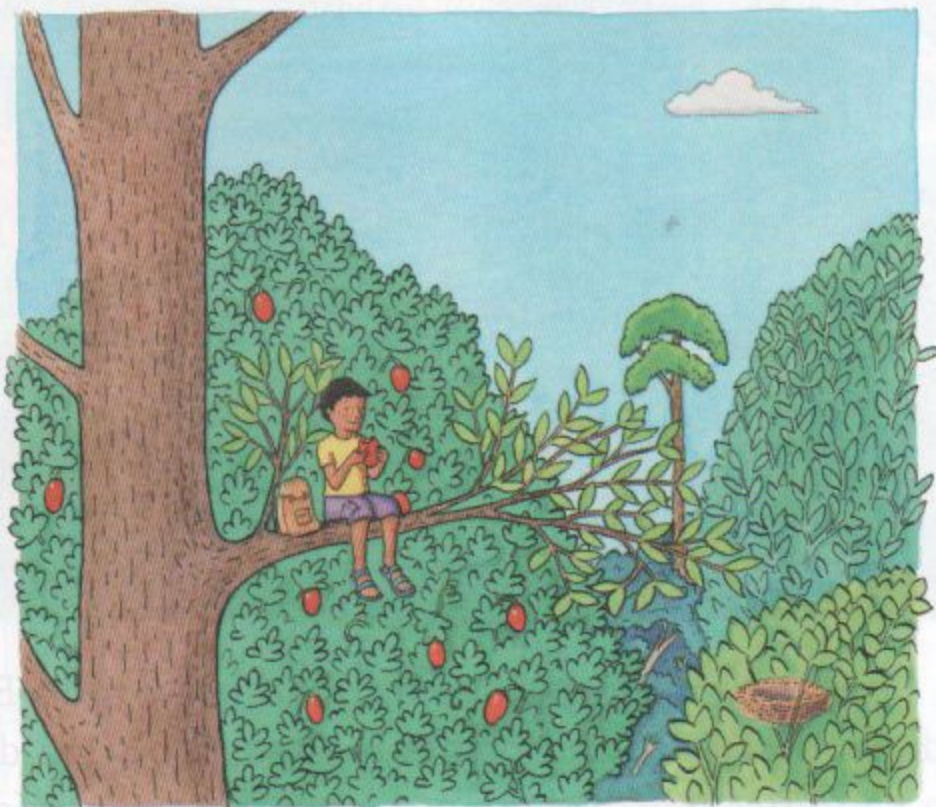

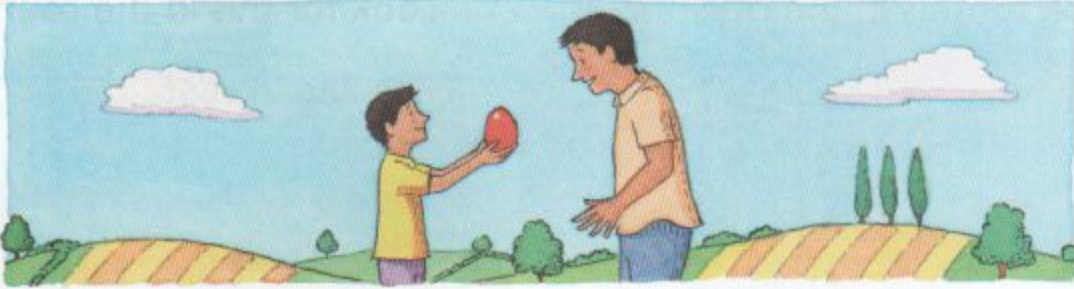


'I must give this fruit a name,' he thought. 'I know. It's a tomango!'

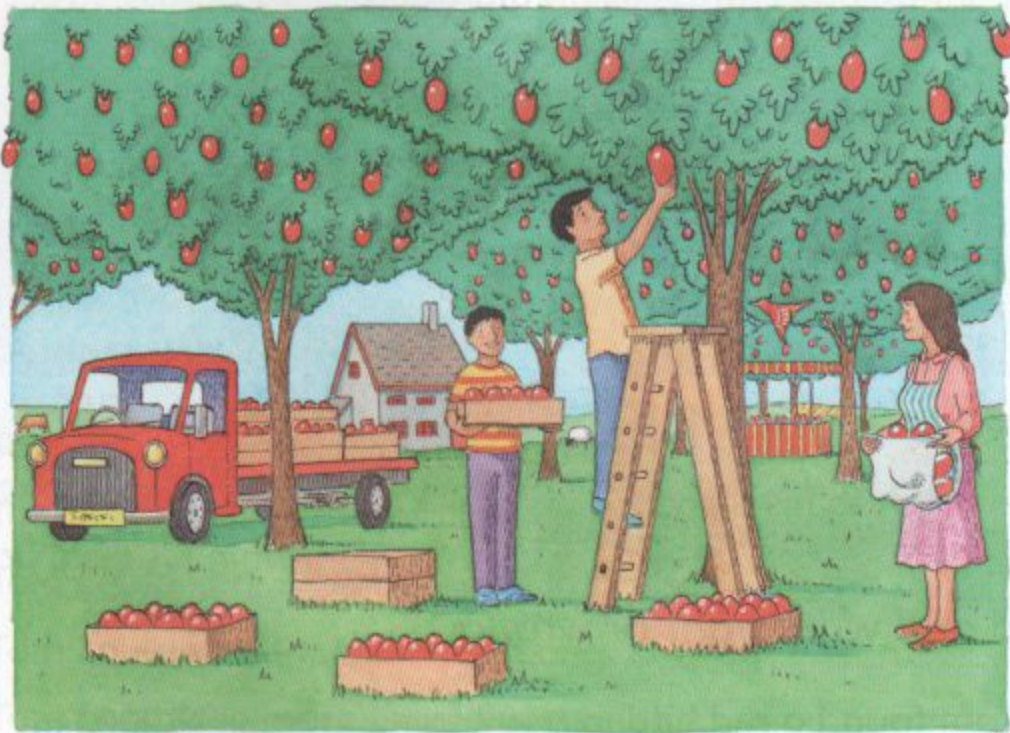


Tom climbed back down the tree and he ran home to show the fruit to his father.

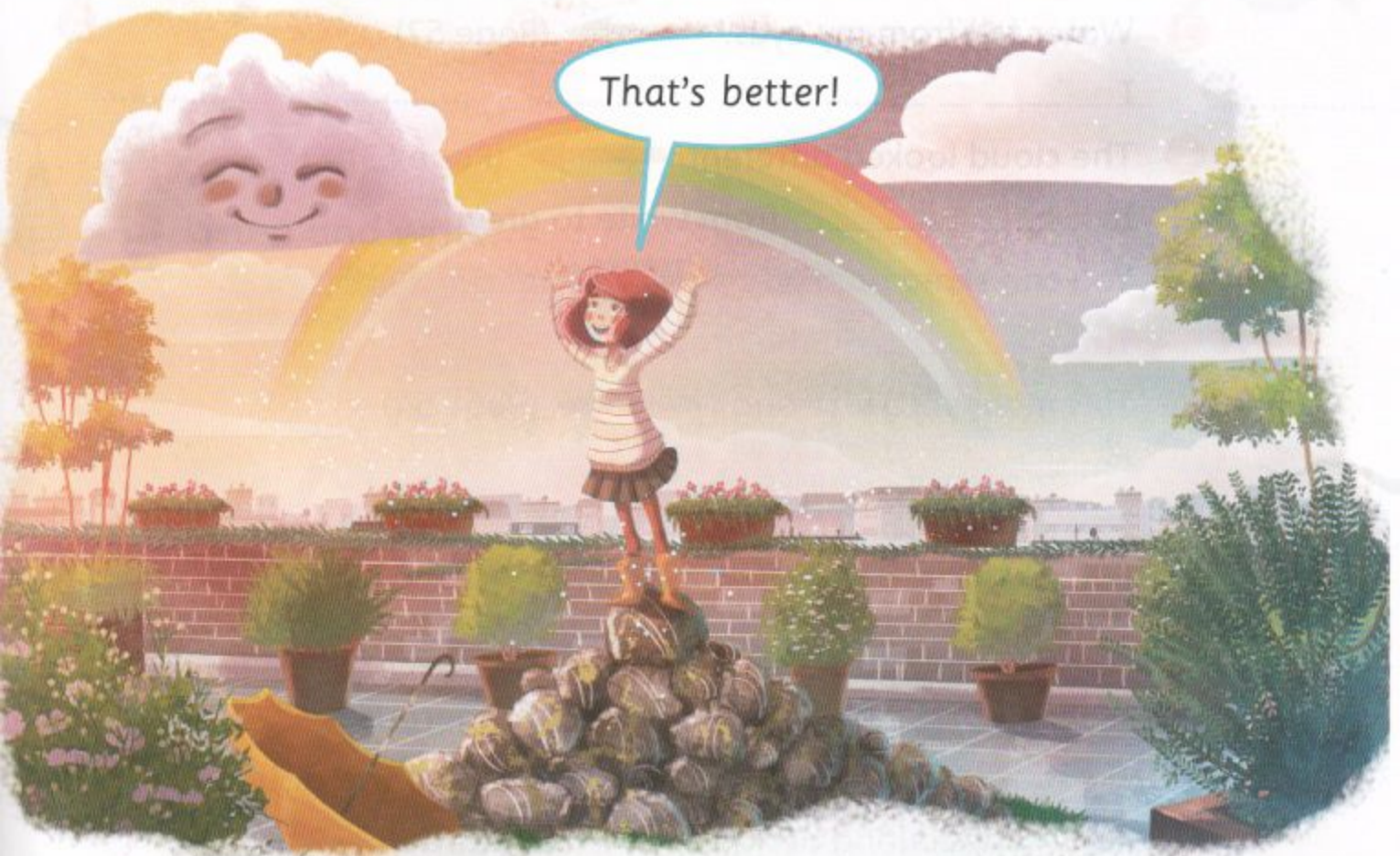


'Fantastic!' laughed Lily. 'Now, Come on! Are you feeling better or worse?'

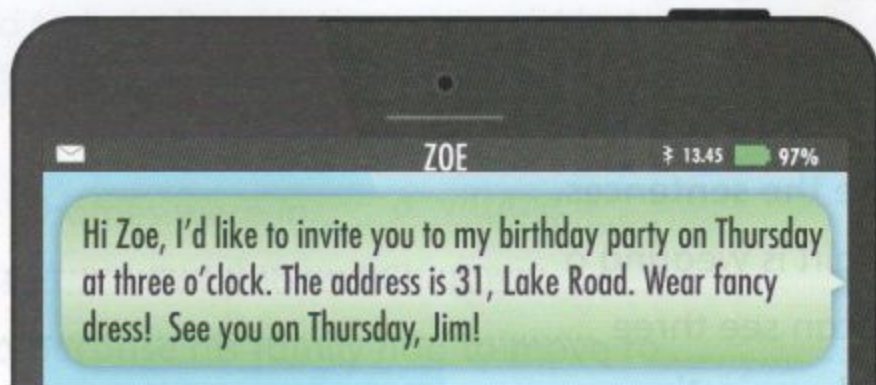

Last Tuesday, Jim sent Zoe a text message about his party. It said:

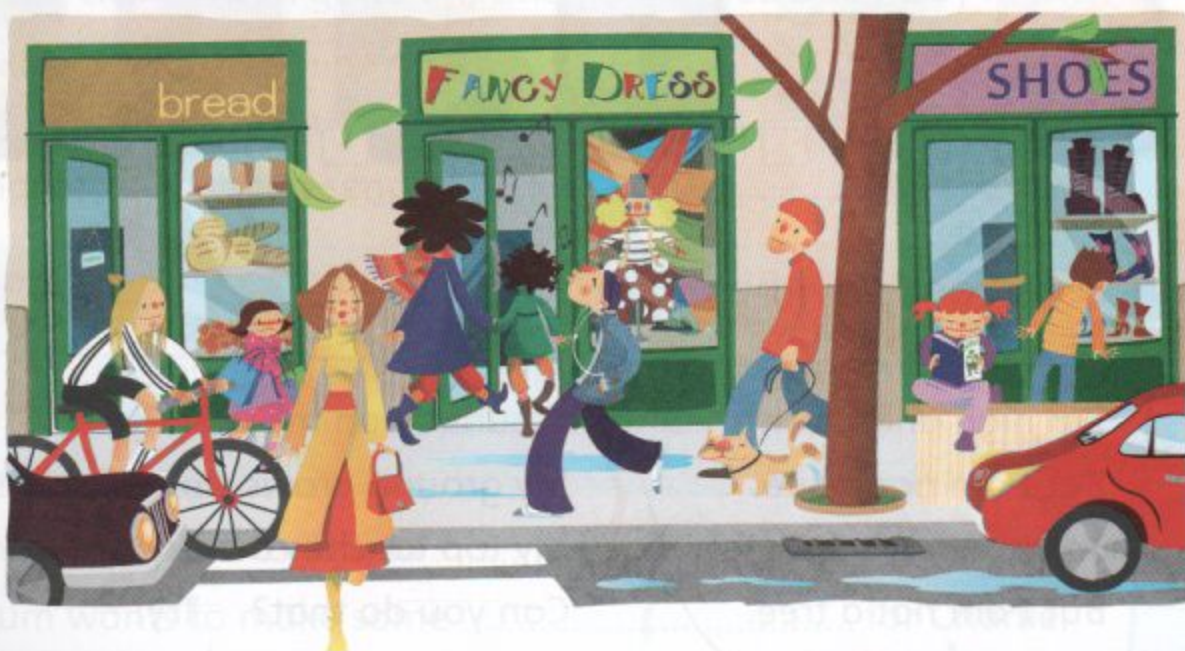


'Great!' thought Zoe. 'Parties are always fun, but a fancy-dress party is very exciting!' She went to tell her mother about Jim's text.
